DIRECTOR'S NOTES

The musical version of *Les Misérables* was originally conceived by French songwriter Alain Boublil in the mid 1970's while he was watching a performance of *Oliver!* in London. As the show played out in front of him, he had the idea to adapt Victor Hugo's novel into a musical. The character of the "Artful Dodger" was his inspiration for "Gavroche" and from there all the amazing characters from the novel started to come to life.

He approached French composer Claude-Michel Schönberg with his idea, and the two developed a rough synopsis. Two years later they developed a concept album which was released in 1980 and in that same year it was performed for the first time on stage at the Palais des Sports in Paris and played over 100 performances.

It was also around this time when producer Cameron Mackintosh came to learn of the concept album. A new musical, *Cats*, had just opened to huge success on London's West End, and theatre-goers' appetite for powerful and emotional musicals was growing rapidly. Mackintosh understood this and recognised the genius of the two French composers Boublil and Schönberg. Their collaboration culminated in the first London production of *Les Misérables* opening in October 1985 at The Barbican Theatre. Despite a poor reception from the critics, the theatre going public embraced the show and Mackintosh's production has provided the world with the longest running West End musical in history. It has been produced in over 40 different countries and translated into 21 languages.

We feel very honoured to have been entrusted by the G&S Society of SA to bring to life this new production of *Les Misérables* to South Australian audiences. We are thrilled and have been blessed to have such an exceptional cast to portray this incredible story of redemption, compassion, duty, selflessness, relationships and at its core, life and society.

Over the centuries lives have been spent and lives have been given to further the causes which define our freedoms. Freedom to live without poverty, freedom of faith to believe or not believe, the freedom to live without the fear of domestic violence, without persecution, without discrimination, the freedom of who we choose to love and who we choose to marry, the freedom to speak out against governments and regimes who threaten to take away freedoms.

As you watch and experience this production of *Les Misérables*, our invitation to you, the audience, is to reflect on your life, think about the freedoms we have and the sacrifices others before us have made for all of us to have those freedoms and to consider the way we think of others.

We hope you enjoy the journey as much as we have enjoyed bringing it to you.

DIRECTOR

David's association with amateur theatre spans over 25 years both as a performer and as a director. During this time he has appeared in productions for many of Adelaide's theatre companies including Therry Dramatic Theatre Company, The Met, Mayfair Theatre Company, Independent Theatre, The Adelaide Rep and The Hills Musical Theatre Company. Although David has performed many roles in musical theatre, he also has appeared in a number of plays including *Run For Your Wife, Noises Off, Shadowlands, On Golden Pond* and Mixed Salad's critically acclaimed production *Love Valour Compassion*, where he performed the dual roles of brothers John and James.

David has also directed a number of highly successful and loved musical productions including Sweet Charity, Chicago, Bye Bye Birdie, Hello Dolly!,

Annie and Thoroughly Modern Millie (most recently for the Society in 2016). His productions of Pippin, Crazy For You and The Drowsy Chaperone won The Adelaide Theatre Guide's Curtain Call Award for Best Musical in 2009, 2012 and 2013 respectively and his production of Legally Blonde received a best musical nomination in 2015. In addition to musicals, he has also directed plays for The Adelaide Rep including Come Back to the Five and Dime, Jimmy Dean, Jimmy Dean and the highly acclaimed production of August: Osage County, which won best drama in the Curtain Call Awards in 2015.

Linda Williams DIRECTOR

Linda is an experienced director, choreographer and performer. She directed Jesus Christ Superstar, 42nd Street and A Chorus Line for Mayfair Theatre Company. Teaming up with fellow director David Sinclair for the first time 8 years ago, she choreographed four award-winning shows - Legally Blonde, The Drowsy Chaperone and Pippin for the Hills, and Crazy for You for Therry. Her other choreographic credits include The Pirates of Penzance - G&S Society, The Secret Garden - G&S Society, Oklahoma!- MS Society, Irene - Therry, Seven Brides for Seven Brothers - Mayfair, Sentimental Bloke - Hills and others for a variety of companies. Linda's onstage credits include the role Nicky (Sweet Charity), Aldonza (Man of La Mancha), Mona (Chicago), Zaneeta (Music Man), Dorcas (Seven Brides) and Kim (Showboat) and she was part of the first SA non-professional production of Les Misérables in 1994.



Peter Johns

MUSICAL DIRECTOR

You may recognise the back of Peter's head from him conducting musicals over the last 17 years. He is the founder of Irregular Productions, producing and musically directing Jason Robert Brown's Songs for a New World, and in March 2015, the Adelaide premiere of [title of show]. Irregular Productions is the co-producer of Broadway Sessions (www.broadwaysessions.com.au), a monthly, all-inclusive music theatre performance and curated open-mic night (say that quickly 10 times), where Peter is also the musical director and pianist. Peter has toured as an accompanist around Australia, New Zealand, Europe, the UK and the USA, and accompanies soloists and choirs from around South Australia. He has played piano for many cabaret shows in the Adelaide Fringe Festival and Adelaide Cabaret Fringe Festival.

Peter's musical theatre credits include, as musical director: Violet, Next to Normal, The Story Of My Life, The Light In The Piazza, You're A Good Man Charlie Brown, Into the Woods, Disney's Beauty and the Beast, [title of show], Avenue Q, Fiddler on the Roof, Oliver!, Monty Python's Spamalot, Chicago, Sweeney Todd: The Demon Barber of Fleet Street, The Sound of Music, Urinetown the Musical, The Witches of Eastwick, Little Shop of Horrors, Seussical the Musical, Grease, Scrooge, A Fractured G&S Trilogy, Once Upon a Mattress, NLTC 50th Birthday Gala; as conductor: City of Angels; as associate conductor: Rent; as assistant musical director: Jesus Christ Superstar, Godspell, South Pacific, Copacabana. Peter has also played keyboard in over 25 other productions. In the 2015 Fringe Festival, Peter made his on-stage debut as Larry, the pianist and music director, in the sold out season of [title of show]. He even had lines!

Mark is an award-winning and respected music theatre, opera, cabaret and big band performer. His credits include multiple Adelaide Festivals and the Brisbane Festival, State Opera of SA (where he has played several minor principal roles in main stage productions, and is a proud long-term member of the Chorus), SINGular Productions, Ding! Productions, Six Foot Something Productions, Aerial and MOatesArt Productions (Mark Oates and the Daniel Brunner Pretty Big Band and Love in the key of B(acharach)). He is a regular singer with the Adelaide Art Orchestra and has toured with them, State Opera of SA and SINGular Productions for Country Arts SA, as well as producing and performing several sold-out seasons in the Adelaide Fringe. For the Society, Mark has played the roles of Jean Valjean (Les Misérables), Archibald Craven (The Secret Garden), the Pirate King (The Pirates of Penzance) and the Baker (Into the Woods).

Andrew Crispe

JAVERT

Andrew is an established freelance performer and vocal coach, and from 2009 has been a member of the State Opera of SA's Chorus. Since 2006 Andrew has played many leading and supporting roles throughout Adelaide's community theatre. In 2008 and 2009, Andrew played Marius in the Society's seasons of Les Misérables. Nominated for Best Male Performance Awards for his role as Don Lockwood (Singin' In The Rain) and the Beast (Beauty and the Beast), Andrew recently won the TASA Best Male Performance Award for Edward Bloom (BIG FISH). Andrew co-wrote and performed in the sold-out season of Villain-Ville: A Musical Exploration of Villainy and Evil in the 2015 Fringe Festival. Prologue: 1815 - Toulon

After 19 years of imprisonment for stealing bread for his starving family, convict Jean Valjean is released on parole by a policeman, Javert. However, his 'ticket-of-leave' identity papers mark him as a criminal and he is reviled by the populace. Taken in by the kindly Bishop of Digne, the embittered Valjean steals his host's silver and absconds. When Valjean is arrested, instead of condemning him, the Bishop gifts the silver to Valjean on the proviso that he start a new life as an honest man. Valjean breaks his parole by tearing up his ticket-of-leave and assumes a new identity.

1823 Montreuil-sur-Mer

Valjean is now the mayor of the town and owner of a factory. A fight breaks out amongst his workers after they discover that one of them, Fantine, has a secret illegitimate child. Although Valjean breaks up the fight, he delegates its resolution to his factory foreman, whose lecherous advances Fantine has previously rejected. Fantine is dismissed and cast out into the streets.

The Red Light District

To support her daughter, Fantine sells her locket, her hair and eventually, herself. After a fight with a customer, a gravely ill Fantine is arrested by Javert, however, Valjean intervenes and insists that the girl be taken to hospital.

After Valjean saves a local man from being crushed by a runaway cart, Javert begins to suspect Valjean's true identity, but dismisses the idea, telling the Mayor that the escaped convict Valjean has just been arrested.

The Hospital

Unable to condemn another to suffer in his place, Valjean reveals his true identity to Javert. Visiting the dying Fantine, Valjean promises to care for her daughter, Cosette. Javert confronts him and refuses to allow Valjean time to rescue Cosette. They struggle and Valjean escapes, with Javert swearing to hunt him down.

The Inn, Montfermeil

For five years Cosette has been treated as a slave at the inn purchased by the amoral Thénardier from the proceeds of looting the battlefield at Waterloo. Whilst Cosette lives in rags, Madame Thénardier pampers her own daughter, Éponine. Valjean buys Cosette from the Thénardiers and takes her to Paris.

1832 Paris, the Slums of St Michel

Whilst distributing alms to the poor Valjean and Cosette are set upon by a street gang lead by the now impoverished Thénardiers. Javert, now an Inspector of Police, rescues them but does not recognise Valjean until after he and Cosette have escaped.

During the struggle, a young student, Marius, meets Cosette and love instantly blooms. He enlists the aid of a reluctant Éponine (who is in love with him) to help him find Cosette.

Café of the ABC

A group of idealistic students known as the ABC Society meet at a small café to plan a better society. When Gavroche, a street urchin, brings news of the death of the champion of the poor, General Lamarque, their leader Enjolras takes this as a sign that it is time for revolution. Marius, a member of the ABC, must choose between love and his cause.

The Rue Plumet

Éponine leads Marius to Cosette and the two lovers are united briefly before Marius returns to the ABC. Éponine foils a robbery of Valjean's house by the Thénardier gang. Believing that Javert has found him, Valjean tells Cosette that they must flee the country.

With revolution brewing all are looking towards the future. Cosette and Marius part in despair of meeting again; Éponine mourns the loss of Marius; Valjean plans a safe exile; Javert plots to infiltrate the student group as a spy; Marius and the students prepare for the uprising – and the Thénardiers wait gleefully for the opportunity to plunder and steal from the victims.

ACT 2

The Streets of Paris, the Eve of the Insurrection, 5 June 1832

The students begin to build a barricade in the streets of Paris. Éponine carries a letter from Marius to Cosette, which Valjean intercepts.

The Barricade on the Rue de Villette

The barricade is completed and manned by the students, who defy a warning by the Army to surrender or die. Javert brings false information to Enjolras but is exposed as a spy by Gavroche. Éponine returns to the barricade but is shot.

Searching for Marius, Valjean arrives at the barricade. He is given custody of Javert but instead of killing him, Valjean allows him to escape. All is quiet during the night and Valjean prays to God to protect Marius.

The next morning the army storms the barricade and most of the students are killed.

The Sewer

Severely wounded and unconscious, Marius is pulled into the sewers by Valjean to escape the slaughter. There Valjean encounters Thénardier robbing the corpses of the dead. Javert also meets them in the sewers and Valjean pleads for time to take Marius to safety. The mercy shown to him by Valjean at the barricade has shattered the inflexible principles by which Javert lives his life. He lets Valjean go but then, unable to cope, commits suicide by jumping into the River Seine. Marius recuperates, cared for by Cosette but unaware that it was Valjean who saved him. When he confesses his past, Marius agrees that Valjean must leave to protect them.

The Wedding

The Thénardiers try to blackmail Marius, alleging Valjean to be a murderer by producing a ring that was on the corpse as proof. Marius recognises the ring as his own and realises that Valjean was his unknown saviour on the night that the barricades fell. Rushing to the dying Valjean, Marius and Cosette are reconciled with him.
